iii. Plan of Action for above:

The institution has a perspective / strategic plan to help it develop in a systematic and phased manner. The College intends to put proposal before the government to construct new building in order to accommodate more classrooms, laboratories, departmental rooms etc., to revive infrastructure of the institution including library infrastructure and eresources, improvement of the scope and profile of the teaching – learning experience through greater use of ICT, remedial classes for weak students and to develop a strong mentor-mentee system. Further initiatives are being taken conduct webinars. to seminars/conferences and FDPs and to increase industry-academia linkages through MoUs to make education practical and need based. Guidelines of NEP 2020 will be incorporated. Green initiatives will be taken to conserve environment and natural resources of the area. This will help to ensure sustainability.

No. of programmes organized (Trainings, workshops, IPR, etc.) **IQAC:** In pursuance of its Action Plan for performance evaluation, assessment and accreditation and quality up-gradation of institutions of higher education, the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore proposes that every institution should establish an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IOAC) as a quality sustenance measure. College has Internal Quality Assurance Cell. Though the cell had been working since 2016 but its constitution as per the revised guidelines took place on 30/10/2023. Since then IQAC has been convening regular meetings and the important decisions are being taken.

i. Number of Meetings per Year:

In the session 2024-25, four IQAC meetings took place on dated 25th July 2024, 16th December 2024, 19th February 2025 and 24th February 2025 respectively in which different decisions were taken and plan of action was carried out to enhance quality of teaching-learning in the institution.

ii. Number of Programmes Organised:

In the session 2024-25, IQAC has taken initiatives to organize various programmes as given below:

a) On 23rd October 2024, IQAC of the College organised an expert talk on 'Career Opportunities and Imperative Skills: Pathways to Professional Progression' in which Ms Amandeep Kaur, Director, Institute of Professional Banking & Mankaran Educational Trust, was the resource person.

She talked about career opportunities in public and private sectors, imperative skills for career progression and career roadmap. Approximately 80 students attended the session by virtual class and online mode.
